Marksmanship team is up and running again and hopefully next year with many more cadets. This program is a good and VERY FUN program to get in and take advantage of while you can, as space is limited. The U.S Grant Marine Corps Marksmanship program is the only Marine Corps program in Oklahoma City. Cadets all come from different classes. There are nine cadets on our Marksmanship team. Our instructors are retired Marines- Lieutenant Colonel Rossow and Master Sergeant Vasquez. They are the instructors but the cadets are expected to exhibit leadership and run the class. Cadets are active leaders in the classroom and collectively decide and choose what to do for the day. If there are available competitions we determine if we will attend based on interest and of course we all want to go!

Marksmanship is an all year-round class. This year we were able to



compete against different schools and it was fun. The other competition was held in Crooked Oak Elementary in Oklahoma City. The competition was hours long. We had to shoot in three different positions. The positions were standing, kneeling and prone.

Prone is considered the easiest out of the three and standing is definitely the hardest. During the competitions we had to shoot twenty shots in each position. It was definitely fun, but also difficult having to hold the rifle for extended periods of time for each position. Breaks are allowed if needed, just raise your hand and ask if you can step off your shooting lane. Shooters are given five minutes in between each position to set up for the next position.

Marksmanship teaches us about leadership and how to think for ourselves and do stuff ourselves. It teaches us lifelong skills that we will need and use once we get out of high school. It's also a fun class where all the cadets get to know each other and get to work together. It's also a chance to learn how to shoot an air rifle correctly. Our routine includes firing preparation, so once we get to the class we work together to get the tables out of the way for our shooting lanes. Then we get our rifles out and ground them. Targets are put up and our equipment organized depending on the position we are using.

Once firing is complete, we open our bolt action and put away our rifles. We only have five firing lanes so the males and females alternate to shoot but if there is an open space than anyone can fill it. Honestly, I

think Marksmanship is a fun, challenging, and competitive class. You learn life skills you will need out in the world. You learn to become a leader and how to think for yourself. **You learn about obedience and discipline, self-control, and patience.** You learn how to follow rules and how to become a better listener. You learn to become a better version of yourself and how to present yourself. All this plus I learned how to shoot an air rifle correctly!
